Hospital at Home (H@H)

is a short-term, targeted intervention providing acute level hospital care in an **individual's own home** or homely setting.¹

Older people/acute adult Hospital at home:

- has high satisfaction and patient preference across a range of measures¹
- reduces pressure on unscheduled acute care in hospitals by avoiding admissions and accelerating discharge, and¹
- has consistent evidence of **lower costs** compared to inpatient care.¹

What we do

Develop resilience of services: Support NHS boards/HSCPs to improve the resilience and maturity of their H@H services.


Develop new H@H services: Support NHS boards/HSCPs to implement new older people/ acute adult H@H services.

Identify opportunities for technology: Evaluate the impact that point of care testing has on the delivery of H@H

National Learning System: Enable older people/acute adult H@H services to share and learn from each other.


Impact this quarter...

Almost 14% increase in patients managed by hospital at home services²



compared to...

3596 patients were managed by H@H services from July to September 2023



4082 patients were managed by H@H services from July to September 2024

H@H services prevented over 4,000 people spending time in hospital during July to September 2024, relieving pressure from A&E and the Scottish Ambulance Service.

Working with 13 NHS boards across Scotland



We are working with services across 13 NHS boards to create new services, improve the resilience of existing services and evaluate new ways of working.

Expanding services

NHS Dumfries and Galloway have progressed beyond a pilot phase and introduced admission avoidance in July 2024

NHS Western Isles are expanding their service to the Southern Isles and have seen their first patient on Uist

Royal Alexandra Hospital 534 beds


Hospital at Home, Scotland 510 equivalent beds

University Hospital Wishaw 491 beds _____

University Hospital Hairmyres 453 beds

In September 2024, there was the equivalent of 510 beds with an occupancy rate of 80%. This is similar to the size of Royal Alexandra Hospital and larger than University Hospital Wishaw.

Point of Care Testing (POCT)



NHS Lanarkshire is trialling point of care testing technology (POCT). Early findings suggests it has helped with faster decision making in 54% of cases.

Our work will capture the potential benefits and practical implications of POCT with several services throughout Scotland.
