

Learning Summary Linburn Road Health Centre

The **aim** of the practice is to **safely** reduce the number of acute prescriptions from over 30% of overall prescriptions issued to under 20% by July 2022 (over a 6 month period).

Background



Linburn Road Health Centre is an urban practice with a list size of nearly 9000 and a younger than average population based in Dunfermline. It is a 2c practice (meaning it is under the management of NHS Fife) currently running with a lot of locum GPs.



The practice identified two key areas of focus:

Medication reviews

The practice initially considered the staff skill mix required to complete level 1, 2 and 3 reviews in order to reduce their backlog.

- Level 1 reviews are undertaken by a mixture of staff
- Level 2 and 3 reviews are currently only done by pharmacists.

The practice piloted guidance developed by a pharmacist to allow pharmacy technicians to undertake level 2 reviews.

Standard operating procedures (SOPs)

The practice used Scottish Therapeutics Utility (STU) data to identify repeatable acute prescriptions that could be moved to permissible repeat prescriptions including:

- anti-depressants
- progesterone only pill
- anti-histamines
- creams/emollients
- paracetamol/codeine/tramadol

A number of patients taking anti-depressant medication met the criteria for moving to repeat prescriptions as they had been on stable doses for a significant period of time. The practice utilised a <u>medication review letter</u> that had been **implemented elsewhere**. This gives clear correspondence from the patient on how stable they are on their medication and allows the patient to make an appointment if required. Their medication can then be added to permissible repeat with an appropriate limited number of issues.

This work was largely carried out proactively with clinicians working through lists to identify appropriate patients. The work will be maintained reactively, being actioned as and when patients request prescriptions, going forward.

Impact and learning



- The practice continue to use STU data to **measure** the number of repeatable and overall acute prescriptions issued each month to identify any **improvements**.
- The acute prescriptions, as a percentage of the overall medications issued, dropped from 31.5% in February 2022 to 29.3% in April 2022. GPs are confident that if this continues to decrease, it could reduce their acute prescribing workload.
- Input from the Pharmacotherapy team is increasing the number of reviews being undertaken which gives confidence to switch medications from acute prescription to repeat issue.
- Feedback from patients suggests that changes have improved their experience of ordering prescriptions.
- Administration staff have noticed a reduction in their processing time when re-issuing prescriptions.



- A pharmacist external to this project will be sharing and implementing the medication review letter in another practice.
- The practice plan to introduce standard **key prescribing parameters** to ensure **prescribing plans** are recorded in medical records.
- The practice plan to create a formal **practice agreement** for switching prescriptions from acute to repeat.
