Key Learning

Key learning from the event:

- "The importance of listening to a wide variety of people who are involved in QI and patient safety and the use of a co-designed approach to patient safety."
- "Hard to pick a single thing... But balancing top down and bottom up by coordination and co-creation."
- "It's ok to say it's not ok."
- "Be clear about what good looks like. Get the technical stuff right, reduce inconsistencies."
- "Setting up clear clinical care pathways and patient-centred care."

- "We should be evaluating QI programmes carefully. We should co-design much more."
- "Importance of creating time and safe spaces for communication."
- "This is the first face to face event since I've come to work in improvement and the whole experience has been valuable to me. Lots to reflect on, read about and links to be made."
- "Safety huddles and national work and opportunities to use the learning."
- "Complexity and need for leadership to support staff in their Patient Safety work."

Applying Learning into Work

The anticipated application of learning on ways of working:

- "Involving our patients can be challenging...but essential as they are the voices we need to be listening to."
- "The concept of psychological safety."
- "Make use of resources available from SPSP."
- "Linking with colleagues within own board and others to develop real workable solutions."
- "Thinking about connected systems, trying to do improvement work in this way not top down or bottom up."

- "The importance of Priority Thickets and understanding the signals in the system that identify when things are not going well."
- "Develop into an empathetic, courageous, approachable leader."
- "Remember the power of communication in planning QI."
- "Consider how we bring more patient/service user collaboration in to what we do."
- "How to address patient safety in a positive manner."
- "Using a QMS approach to review huddles."

Even Better If



- "If the workshops in the afternoon could also be virtual."
- "A bit more time to ask the presenters a question."
