Shared learning

Captured below are some of the discussion points from the chat box which people may find useful.

If concerned about support for a younger person with a learning disability and dementia who may be much younger than fellow residents, speak with the case holding inspector. They need to show that they will meet the needs of the person and the people who already live in the home.

A care home does not need to apply to lower the overall age. It can be done via referring to a 'named person' on the registration certificate. However, the Care Inspectorate is (to end of March) permitting admission of people under 65 years without a variation being granted. This should be discussed with the case holding inspector.

Post-diagnostic support (PDS) is not routinely provided for people with dementia and a learning disability currently within PDS services. However, NHS Education for Scotland (NES) are scoping out learning disability team dementia knowledge and skills and associated training to enhanced level of the Promoting Excellence Framework in order to deliver PDS and beyond in dementia care.
